


ANNUAL FUND UPDATE

FOUNDERS' DAY 2008

Almost 100 Brothers Joined Together for the 140th Anniversary of the Founding of Pi Kappa Alpha

Commemorated the 40th Anniversary of our House at 3916 Spruce Street and Undergrad Awards Presented

On March 29th, 35 alumni joined almost 60 undergraduates at the Inn at Penn in Philadelphia to celebrate Founders' Day. This year marked the 140th anniversary of the founding of Pi Kappa Alpha at the University of Virginia.

The evening's theme was dedicated to the 40th anniversary of the occupation of the chapter house at 3916 Spruce Street. Brothers **Rich Myers '69** and **Mark Perna '68** provided some personal insights on what it was like for the brothers who were involved in the transition from the old house on Locust Walk to the new house on Spruce Street. Mark shared how the brotherhood coped when they found themselves without housing at the beginning of the school year because the new house was not yet ready. He detailed the ways the brothers scrambled to assist getting the house ready for occupancy.

Dave Deldotto '67 followed with a video presentation that included some notable Pike references. He also commented on the world of the late sixties as compared to today from the perspective of college students of each era.

BETA PI LEGACY FUND

Endowment Goal of \$350,000 to Help Fund Leadership and Educational Conferences

With Commitments to Help from Only a Handful of Brothers We're at One Third of Our Goal

A few years ago the International Fraternity rolled out its revamped leadership and educational training programs collectively called Pike University. It consists of Regional Leadership Summits (held in various locations around the country for the benefit of all chapter members), The Academy and Chapter Executive Conference (targeted at chapter officers held every January and in the summers of odd numbered years), The International Convention (held in various cities around the country in even numbered summers for the benefit of all undergraduate and alumni members), A Volunteer Forum (for alumni who mentor undergraduate members or serve on alumni associations and house corporations) and The True Pike Challenge, an outdoor survival program held in Boulder, Colorado for select undergrads and alumni volunteers. These programs are

considered the very best in the fraternity world and are presented by top notch educators and organized by the fraternity's professional staff.

While a portion of the cost of these programs is funded by the Fraternity's Educational Foundation, there remains a considerable expense associated with registration fees, food costs, and travel/hotel expenses. Your alumni association has formed a pilot program with the Educational Foundation called the Beta Pi Legacy Fund through which we hope to create an endowment of sufficient size that will generate enough funds to subsidize our undergraduate leaders' expenses associated with attendance at these superb leadership events. The alumni who made annual cash contributions over the last five years to help defray these expenses were able to watch as


those undergraduate leaders who attended returned to the chapter invigorated with new ideas and drive. Now, however, is the time to ensure this leadership training will benefit Beta Pi in perpetuity.

Our endowment goal is \$350,000 and we presently have commitments for approximately one third of that sum from just a handful of brothers. ALUMNUS PROFILE

Former President of Beta Pi Now Serving as an Alumni Advisor

Glenn Goldstein '00 Shares His Experiences with Undergrads to Help Keep the Chapter Strong

Why did you choose to join Pi Kappa Alpha?

That's a funny story actually. When I came to Penn, I had no intention of joining a fraternity and initially only attended rush events for the free food. However, after hanging out with the brothers during the two weeks of rush, I decided, along with a group of my friends, that the chapter and the house were the right fit for us.

What was fraternity life like during your time at Penn?

Many of us took classes together, ate dinner together at the house, hung out in each others' rooms and spent the majority of our weekends having fun in the basement before late night runs to Pat's. We were also very competitive about intramural sports versus other fraternities.

What kind of influence has being a Pi Kappa Alpha had on your life?

I sometimes joke that serving as President of Beta Pi was the toughest job I've had. I dealt with \$17,000 in debt, the weekly challenge to improve our relationship with the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Affairs and having to appease brothers in the chapter who didn't always feel the same way. As a result, I learned a lot about leadership, compromise and the importance of being an excellent Beirut player to settle disputes. I never thought about Pi Kappa Alpha from a networking perspective when I was in school, but both of my job changes since then have been the result of introductions made by Beta Pi brothers.

Do you stay in contact with any brothers?

I've stayed in contact with most of the brothers from my year as well as many who

graduated within a few years of me. Two of my teammates on a soccer team in Philly are Beta Pi alums.

Did you have a nickname during college and if so how did you get it?

"Scrap" – I don't like to see leftovers go to waste and I also developed an expertise in the low-cost acquisition of party supplies. "Rabbi" – I was one of the few Jewish brothers during my time and my Beta Pi brothers were a marvelously creative group of gentlemen.

What were some of your favorite events from when you were an undergrad?

One of my favorite events every other year was tailgating for the Penn-Princeton football game. Another memorable event was our Date Auction Fundraiser where we teamed with a sorority to raise money for Cancer Research by auctioning off dinners with brothers who advertised their appeal in an on-stage performance.

What are some of your greatest memories of Pi Kappa Alpha?

In no particular order, both during school and as an alumni... being the best man in a Beta Pi brother's wedding and getting to know his family, doing a West Coast road trip with three other brothers and staying at multiple Pi Kappa Alpha houses along the way, the two weeks of rush every January, watching a Beta Pi brother finish in the top 10 of the Army Best Ranger Competition, a packed basement with everyone belting out 'Livin' on a Prayer' and going to the World Cup in Germany with five other Beta Pi's.

Did you live in the house?

I spent three years in the house and was lucky enough to have a single each time. I find it amazing how little my hallmates' living habits have changed since college. The messy ones are still incredibly messy

(regardless of attempts otherwise from girlfriends or wives) and the late-night guys still hate waking up early.

Why do you choose to support Pi Kappa Alpha years later?

I was urged by another Beta Pi to take on the role of alumni advisor after moving back to Philly. Originally I wasn't sure what I could contribute, but I realized after spending time back in the house that I can help the chapter avoid reiterating some of the mistakes we made when I was an undergrad. After putting so much effort into the chapter, I want to know it's in good hands.

Why do you feel it is important as alumni to give back?

Even as a younger alumnus, I can recognize that my relationships with brothers from my years are still relatively easy to maintain but that will become tougher over time. A strong chapter and a strong alumni association help preserve those relationships. In addition, I think coming back to the chapter house for Homecoming or Founders' Day is important. Just hearing "how the house used to be" has an impact on the undergrads. In addition, it's good for alumni of various generations to interact. Even if the goal is to resolve a dispute of Beer Pong versus Beirut, I've never heard an alumnus say they regret coming back.

Please tell us a little about what you're doing now.

I live in Center City Philadelphia. I grew up in Miami before coming to Penn. I enjoy soccer, reading and watching the downfall of American capitalism. I work for a small investment firm located in the Philadelphia suburbs.
